Chaplain's Reports

Although unable to attend the March meeting, Deacon Dan submitted the following via email as the Chaplain's report for March:

In lieu of my presence, I want to offer you some insights about our pope gained after having spent three days with the clergy of our diocese listening to the papal dean of the Vatican tribunal, who promoted the Pope's desire that we clergy (and by our example and guidance, the lay faithful) remember that the salvation of souls is key to God, and that following Canon Law is only effective if it promotes the salvation of souls (Canon 1752: ""the salvation of souls... must always be the supreme law in the Church, [and it] is to be kept before one's eyes."")

The following excerpt sums up what the Pope is all about - it's a commentary about the Pope's infamous comment, "Who am I to judge?"— which many pundits misunderstood as the pope being wishy-washy about upholding Church doctrine (when in fact he was objecting to the propensity to reject the full humanity of a person who has an obvious sin by those whose sins may be more hidden - a hypocrisy Jesus often points out in Scripture):

Francis has never suggested that he advocates for doctrinal change, or a change in the church's formal antipathy toward LGBTQ sexuality. Rather, **his focus has always been on welcoming all would-be worshippers into the fold, focusing less on whether they are "sinners" (after all, according to Catholic doctrine, we're all sinners in some form or another) and more on whether they have access to the**

community of worshippers, and attendant sacraments, necessary for a Christian life. For Francis, focusing on an individual element of a person — whether their sexuality or another perceived sin — is a mistake and detracts from the dignity of the whole person.

If you remember the movie "Dead Man Walking" with Sr. Prejean who worked to help the man on death row to repent of his sins and accept Christ's mercy... she never gave up on his humanity, on his soul. She never judged him as a murderer, his sin; but she saw him as beloved by Christ, made in God's image, a man who made many bad choices, but whose soul (as Jesus taught us in yesterday's gospel) was worth saving.

The pope through his dean who spoke to us urged us to read the controversial [chapter 8 of Amoris Laetitia](#) as a pastoral approach to redeeming those who otherwise our laws might consider to be outcasts, unredeemable, modern lepers (my words); the notion of **gradualness** (bringing lost souls along gradually, moving them closer to church teaching, and to Christ, rather than just rejecting them as unfit for acceptance by the church because they are outside church law), and the ideas of **accompanying** (walking their journey with them back to alignment with church teaching...gradually), **discerning** (listening to their situation with Christ's merciful heart), and **integrating** (doing what we can to be a





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bridge from their current situation to the goal situation of realignment with the church).

Accompanying, discerning, and integrating. It's a beautiful summary of what we do with our kids. We walk with them through infancy and childhood, through school and early adulthood, until they are on their own; we help them discern right from wrong, teaching them, explaining things, reminding them, warning them, and rewarding them for good choices and challenging them for errant behaviors and bad choices; and we continue to walk and guide as part of their lives, involving them in our lives and being present and witnessing our ideals and beliefs, while making ourselves available to be included in their lives - an integration (RELATIONSHIP) that results ultimately in their standing tall and walking straight their own journeys of faith in this world.

May we pray for the Pope, whose controversy mirror's Christ's own, when he challenged the Pharisees and Scribes and scholars of the law of his time to reconsider their practices, and their proclivity to denounce Him when He healed on the sabbath, or spoke "blasphemy" when he uttered what His Father gave him to say (see today's Gospel reading).

Chaplain's Report for April - Deacon Dan Lupo provided the following thoughts. Paraphrasing his report in his words:

This is a bit of a departure from the usual. Recently, I have shared emails with the council on a variety of topics, and unfortunately all too frequently they deal with disturbing issues we face, perhaps exemplified by the euthanasia story out of Denmark. In stark contrast, this is the very real story of the President of France, Emmanuel Macron who stressed the importance of a Catholic voice in the country's political debates, particularly on bioethical issues, in an address to the French bishops April 9. He stated "What I want to call you tonight is to engage politically in our national debate and in our European debate because your faith is part of the commitment that this debate needs." He went on to say "Our contemporaries need, whether they believe or do not believe, to hear from another perspective on man other than the material perspective," he continued, "They need to quench another thirst, which is a thirst for absolute. It is not a question here of conversion, but of a voice which, with others, still dares to **speak of man as a living spirit.**"

Macron's speech comes as bioethical debates continue in France, with parliament preparing to





reform its bioethics laws. The new law will probably try to authorize two main things, against which most of French Catholics are fighting: euthanasia and IVF for single women and lesbian couples, stated Guillaume de Thieulloy, editor of the French Catholic blog *Le Salong Beige*.

Macron's speech is one particular area indicating that there is hope...that God is "tweaking" things. Jesus said to the Pharisees, you are on the wrong path following rules, taking you farther away from God. We need to speak up when the occasion calls for it, and with words and actions.

Deacon Dan cited a recent personal situation in which he was personally challenged. There was a homeless individual outside the church during the recent cold snap, asking for help with shelter for the cold night. The Deacon was able to provide \$60 for a hotel room for the night for this person. Shortly thereafter, following a baptism he was presented with an envelope with a donation. "Is that \$60?" he asked. The astonished father said "yes, how could you know that?" God had quickly validated that the right thing was done. Deacon Dan said that he also wondered whether he had done enough . . should he have done more? We can all experience these moments when suddenly we are challenged to do something and must quickly make a decision, trusting in God. Even if no one gives you a thumb's up, or reimburses you financially, God is there affirming us. He will continue to bless us somehow so we can continue to help. Our Pope is trying to guide us to stand against the swirl toward hedonism and secularism and it starts with us . . . we need to reject the pull of the world and stay with our spiritual life. We need to train ourselves to see the opportunities to stop and help.

Upcoming Events -

4th Degree Fallout for Confirmation – Fr. Michael has asked for the 4th degree to fallout for the Confirmation, Tuesday April 17. Vesting will be at 6:15 PM in the library.

Corporate Communion - We will have a Corporate Communion at the 9 am mass on April 29.

Removing the Temporary Shelter – The temporary shelter outside the PAC will be dismantled tentatively on April 26. If the crew that put it up is available with cordless power drills to disassemble, the job can be easily accomplished as it was put together with screws in anticipation of disassembling. Look for an update either confirming the April 26 date, or identifying the final decision on the date.

Mulching the Campus Grounds – In May we will help provide the labor for spreading mulch in the flower beds and around trees. Consider turning out and helping us save the parish a significant amount of money by eliminating hiring an outside firm.
